## MEFE REPONSE TO COLORADO TRAGEDY

Parker, Colorado, April 19<sup>th</sup>: One of the current tragedies facing Colorado right now is the incredibly devastating earthquake that occurred on Wednesday April 6<sup>th</sup>, 2022. Residents of the northern parts of the city were safely evacuated, but much of the city still lies in rubble and hundreds of people are injured, dead, or still unaccounted for. This quake has been recorded as the largest to ever hit Colorado in history at an 8.7 magnitude. It struck the central foothills of Colorado, centered just north of University of Colorado in Boulder, and could be felt in a much larger area including Superior, Longmont and parts of Northern Denver. Currently about 65% of the students have been reported safe, but 27 died in this tragedy and many more are still unaccounted for by friends and family. It has been reported that there is over \$120 million in damage, and it will take months to get the city back to normal.
